When you write upon a star . . .

What do you see when you gaze up at the starry sky on a clear night?

Joseph Colombo saw music. Creativity can strike at the most unexpected moments.

Colombo, an 18-year-old Winter Springs student at The Boston Conservatory, remembers lying on a driveway and looking out into the universe one night when the inspiration came over him to compose "A Dreamer's Field of Stars."

That composition went on to win the top prize in last year's Young Composer's Challenge, a competition for musicians 13 to 18 years old in the southeastern United States.

This year's contest is just starting to tune up, with a free music-composition workshop scheduled for March 1 in Oriando. After that, young composers can submit songs to be judged and even performed in September by the Orlando Philharmonic Ornchestra at the Bob Carr Performing Arts Centre.

What is the key this year for fellow budding artists? "Being self-critical in every-

"Being self-critical in everything you do but also being true to oneself," Colombo said. "Also, studying with a teacher is invaluable. It is a trade that is hard work."

Colombo picked up the guitar in seventh grade, started playing piano in ninth and began composing in 11th while a student at Winter Springs High.

While contemplating that night on the driveway, he was awed by the endless space and pattern of stars before him. In a way, he also saw his future.

He took about a month to write "A Dreamer's Field of Stars," which he describes as a minimalist piece with notes strung together, yet scattered.

"It was slow getting started and then it burst out," he said

Hearing his winning composition performed last year was "a feeling that you can barely

describe, to have so many musicians make the piece come to life. It gave me immense confidence in what I was doing, that

someone was telling me I can do this."

He lists his musical influences from minimalist composer Philip Glass to classical composer Johann Sebastian Bach. He said he also likes to listen to

He said he also likes to listen to jazz and some rock 'n' roll musicians, such as the Beatles, Red Hot Chill Peppers and Jimi Hendrix.

The competition is sponsored by Steve Goldman, a composer and Winter Park philanthropist; the Orlando Philharmonic Orchestra and University of Central Florida's Center for Research and Education in Arts, Technology and Entertainment.

"This is the only program in the country where young musicians can have their compositions performed by a professional orchestra in concert," Goldman said.

Attendance at the workshop is not mandatory to enter the contest, but participants will be given tips by Orlando Philharmonic conductor Christopher Wilkins and Stella Sung, an internationally known composer and professor of music composition at UCF

Last year's competition attracted composers from as far away as Atlanta. Musicians have until Aug. 1 to submit an entry. Finalists and their music teachers also win money.
